

FIELD TRIP TO IRVING MATERIALS QUARRY MARCH 25--George Heaton

The field trip for March will be to the Irving Materials, Inc. Quarry near Anderson Indiana on Saturday, March 25th. We will plan to meet at the quarry at 10:00 am. Prior to entering the quarry we must stop at the office and receive a short hazard training session, so DO NOT BE LATE. At our club meeting prior to the field trip I will have copies of Irving Materials "Safety Rules for Visitors" and their "Hazard Training and Recognition Checklist" to hand out to those members who plan to attend this field trip. I was asked by their safety director to share these with all who plan to be on this field trip. I also have their release form that you may sign at the meeting before the field trip.

This quarry is noted for its iridescent calcites and its honey colored twin calcites. Also fossils have been found here.

The quarry can be reached by taking I-69 South from Lansing to Anderson, Indiana. Take the Greenfield exit (#22) to Rt. 9 South. The quarry gate is on the left on Rt. 9, just south of the I-69 expressway. Driving time from Lansing to Anderson Indiana is about 5 hours.

The usual assortment of tools and safety equipment for collecting in quarries is needed here. These include a 2-3 lb. crack hammer, chisels of various sizes from small to large, and a sledge hammer for breaking large rocks is often useful. A light hammer such as a geologist's pick is useful for trimming some excess rock from specimens, but be careful not to go too far. Do your final trimming at home. **For safety remember in all quarries you must have a hard hat, steel toed safety boots, and safety glasses or goggles or you cannot enter the quarry.**

MARCH PROGRAM: ANNUAL SILENT AUCTION (jawp)

The auction involves heated bidding wars and light footed leaps around the table, hoping to add something new to your own collection. It's sort of the annual migration of materials from one rock house to another.

IF YOU HAVE THINGS TO SELL: Bid slips including a brief description of the item, your name, and the minimum bid need to be attached to each item you wish to put up for auction. **BE SURE TO FILL OUT THE TOP & BOTTOM PORTION OF YOUR TAG!** Failure to do so makes it nearly impossible to get the money in the proper hands. Plenty of tags will be available at the meeting. **All** money goes to the person who sells the item, not to the club.

HOW TO BUY: Bring lots of small denomination bills and change, a few bigger bills might come in handy as well. Hard core bidders may want their own pencil. No bids may be placed before the auction begins. You must begin with the stated minimum, and increases must be at least 10 cents. At the sound of the horn, all bidding must stop. **THE ITEM GOES TO THE LAST COMPLETED BID.**

TRAVELOGUE--Lila Stevens
