
PROGRAM - Lola Pearson

DR. JAMES TROW, MSU GEOLOGIST

Resuming the series of sketches of members of MSU's Geology Department, we will tell you a little about Dr. James W. Trow.

Dr. Trow was born in Chicago April 21, 1922. His education was unique in that he went through school from kindergarten to a Ph.D. in geology at the University of Chicago. This was possible because of a campus laboratory school covering elementary grades and high school, and because he could choose some excellent professors there at the college level.

Dr. Trow came directly from the University of Chicago to teach in the Geology Department at Michigan State University. His teaching assignments are usually classes in geology for civil engineers, advanced structural geology and cultural introduction to geology.

He has worked extensively as a consultant for government agencies and for mining firms. He worked for the United States Geological Survey on the Michigan iron project. The Cleveland-Cliffs Company had him making surveys in Michigan and Wisconsin. With Anaconda Copper he made a study of the Lake Superior region which included northern Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Ontario. The Elcor Chemical Corporation had him looking for fluorspar in the Big Bend area of Texas. He spent five and a half years with the Chevron Company on a hunt for uranium which took in the northwestern states, the southern Appalachian states, Texas and Pennsylvania. Presently he is consulting with the state of Michigan Division of Geology on the ERDA project. This involves drilling in the sedimentary basins in upper Michigan for scientific information. Five diamond drill holes have been put down to date, four in Marquette County and one in Iron County.

Dr. Trow has acquired a store of practical and interesting information, plus many unusual experiences. He is a fascinating person to hear.

FROM THE AFMS NEWSLETTER

Henry Bonar reported at the National Show in Ogden, Utah last August that wheels have been in motion since President Zahn's request in January that the International Relations Committee develop a list of foreign collecting areas, notable museums and collections as a service to our Federation members who contemplate travelling abroad.we have learned of a World Directory of Mineral Collections, which will be on the market soon, and we have reserved a copy for our use.

Washington. Hours are 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday.

Gem, mineral show set

The 1976 Gem and Mineral Show of the Central Michigan Lapidary and Mineral Society will be Friday, 5-10 p.m.; Saturday, Oct. 12, 10 to 10 and Sunday, Oct. 24, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the Michigan National Guard Armory, 2500 S. Washington.

The theme is "Minerals on the Move," telling what happens to minerals from the time they are formed in their original location until they are ready for human use.

LAST YEAR'S attendance was near 7,000. Dealers came from Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Oregon and Texas.

More than 1,500 school children are already scheduled for free school tours on Friday morning. Call 882-8136 for reservations.

The purpose is to stimulate interest in the rock hobby; to provide information on some of its phases; to give the public the opportunity to see minerals, gems, lapidary work and live demonstrations of lapidary and other rock crafts; and to give collections and craftsmen a place to exchange and obtain materials.

ADMISSION IS adults, 50 cents; teens 25 cents; and 12 and under, with adult, free. Light refreshments will be available, with the MSU Geology Club in charge.

Special attractions this year include meteorites from the Michigan State University Planetarium; a Michigan Department of Natural Resources collection of minerals; a display on mineral collection areas of Michigan, by the Michigan Gemological and Geological Society; Kenneth Ammerman's Youth Talent Award-winning display on the glacier's effect on Michigan; and more than 100 exhibits of very fine minerals and lapidary work, including several from famous private collections.

A silent auction, children's table and rock swap will offer fun-filled ways of getting different material. Live demonstrations will be going on continuously in silversmithing, silver inlay, cabochon cutting and polishing, rock tumbling, hand polishing Petoskey stones, sphere making, faceting, micromounting, mineral photography, sand bottles, sand painting and alabaster carving.

IT WILL include more than 100 exhibits, including working demonstrations of various gem arts, a children's table and a silent auction. There will also be six slide shows and three special meetings.
